Early Years News

Nursery

This week we have taken a journey through all of the seasons after reading the story 'Tree.'

The children have created some beautiful artwork for their calendars, they have identified signs for each of the seasons and they have enjoyed practising their fine motor control through drawing symbols and objects that we might see during Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter.

We have been consolidating our understanding of amounts up to 5 and 10 and we have been identifying the numerals that go with each of these amounts.

The children are continuing to practise their name writing skills and we are so proud of the progress they have already made regarding this.

In keeping with our activities all about Winter, our movie day was timed beautifully and the children loved watching 'Stickman' with chocolate milk and a selection of movie snacks.

Reception

This week the children have continued to do their learning based around our text '*The Leaf Thief*.' The children have been labelling their den designs and using blocks to build and make a den/shelter for the different forest animals. The children have also been labelling different objects found in our story using their phonics knowledge.

In Maths, the children have been looking the composition of 4 and 5. The children have been exploring the numbers by dropping corks into water and saying what numbers they can see. As an extra challenge they had to find the matching Numicon pieces and numerals.

Rehearsals have started in EYFS for our Nativity performance this week. The children have been perfecting their signing and learning a range of songs from our show. They are all beyond excited to share it with everyone! Have a wonderful weekend everyone!

Key Stage 1 News

Year 1

We started the week finishing our retell of 'The Naughty Bus'. We worked as a class to revisit our sentences to check they make sense and edit them with capital letters and full stops in the correct places. We have also completed some writing this week relating to our senses. We discussed what we can see, hear, smell, taste and touch in our school day and even used 'and' to join ideas.

In Math's this week the children have worked on finding missing numbers in a range of addition calculations. We were amazed to discover that the addition and equals symbols could be put in different places and still equal the same amount. We have also explored finding the difference between 2 numbers. We have used subtraction and a number line to support us with this.

In History this week we have created a personal timeline of human growth. We ordered pictures into chronological order including; baby, toddler, child, teenager, adult and elderly. In addition to this we progressed onto ordering dates on a timeline. This was so tricky so we will continue some extra work on this next week!

The children have been completing a spelling test every Friday since half term and I can already see progress! We are also continuing with daily handwriting lessons and the children are proud of their progress with their letter formation and presentation. Well done Year 1! **Miss Lewis**

Year 2

Year 2 have had such an amazing week!

In Maths this week we have proved that we are confident adding two single digit numbers together and know our number bonds to 10 off by heart! We added in many different ways this week; we used counters, multilink, and a number line and used pictorial representations. Next week we will be adding a single digit to a two digit number using all the methods we have learnt this week.

In Writing, we have been focusing on proof reading sentences, spotting mistakes and editing work. We learnt what an adjective, noun and verb is and sorted specific words into the correct groups. Next week we will be learning how to write a recount using adverbs of time to organise our work.

In Science this week we matched materials to their properties and conducted an experiment to see if materials can change their shape.

In Computing, we developed our understanding of what information technology is. We identified devices that are computers and considered how IT can help us both in school and at home.

On Thursday we had our Great Fire of London day and all the children came to school dressed as someone from 1666! We had maids, Samuel Pepys, King Charles II, link boys and a baker. We took

part in lots of fun and exciting activities to help us understand what it was like all those years ago. We wrote with a quill on parchment paper, we designed and made our Tudor house and learnt that Wattle and Daub was used to build the Tudor walls. We learnt that 40 years after the fire, fire marks were introduced so we designed and made our own fire mark. To end our day we stood together to make a bucket chain and passed a bucket down the line and threw water on a fire we had drawn! It was amazing!

Key Stage 2 News

Year 3

This week in English, we have started a new book! At the moment we have just done our 'hook' and made predictions about what the story will be about. Then, we looked at the detailed front cover and discussed whether our predictions had changed from looking at it. We have also looked closely at the first double page of the book and created prepositional noun phrases to describe all the beautiful things we can see. We also used those pages to discuss what activities our main character could get up to in the snow, and practiced writing dialogue between him and his mother.

In maths, the children have looked at what estimation means and have tried really hard with using 'rounding' skills to help them estimate the answers to calculations. We have also looked at adding and subtracting multiples of 100 with a 3-digit number, and also focused on 'finding the difference' between two numbers, using a bead string for support.

In History, we have investigated the main differences between the Palaeolithic Era and the Neolithic era and the children put this information clearly into a table. They followed this up by examining the differences in settlements during these eras and had to create pictures to represent each of them.

In R.E. we have discussed what a prophet is, and we looked at the following prophets; Noah, Moses, Abraham and Jonah.

We have started to look at homophones in Spelling and checking each spelling rule carefully for them.

Year 4

This week in Maths we have started our unit on addition and subtraction. We have started by looking back at number bonds and practising all the facts within 20 to make us super-efficient when we are completing our addition and subtraction problems. We have then started to look at using known facts to calculate mentally.

In English, we have been looking at journalistic language, looking at particular vocabulary and phrases that journalists use when writing newspaper reports which are written in formal language. We then have looked at fact and opinion and what the difference is as this is very important when reporting the news. Finally we have planned, drafted and started writing our newspaper reports on the shocking events of the boy who cried wolf.

In Geography, we have finished off looking at Europe by looking at the small area of Greece Athens. We had started by looking at Europe as a whole, before focusing on Greece and now just a small area in preparation for later in the year when we compare the North-West with the Athens area.

In RHE, we have been looking at Hurtful Behaviour. We have looked at different forms of hurtful behaviour such as name-calling and spreading rumours and the fine line between playful jokes and hurt feelings. We then looked at how we should show kindness and respect to others.

In History, we have been examining Greek pottery as a source and worked like historians to see what it could tell us about life in Ancient Greece. We learned that historians are a little like detectives and use the 5 W's to look at sources to work out information about the past. We looked at some sources from the British Museum and Mrs Shone showed us how a historian would look at them to develop ideas about the Ancient Greeks.

<u>Homework</u>

Clickview - There is a video relating to the features of a newspaper LBQ - A little round up of all the prior learning this term on place value. If children could just have a go at as many as they can. **Mrs Shone**

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Year 5

This week in Year 5 we have practised subtracting using the column method. We recapped taking away without exchanges and then moved onto trickier sums including exchanges and word problems.

In writing, we wrote our newspaper reports about Annie Edson Taylor. We included parenthesis, key facts and direct speech.

In DT, we looked at simple machines including those including pulleys and gears. We looked at photos of every day machines and organised them into those including a pulley and those with a gear.

We looked at the Lindisfarne raid of the Vikings and what they did to the Holy Island. We learnt about the Anglo-Saxons opinion of these "Northmen" - which weren't particularly positive accounts. **Miss Ratcliffe**

Year 6

Year 6 have been classifying and defining all the different types of living organisms in Science.

In Geography, the children have been looking at the importance of the Amazon Rainforest to the World and understanding that humans are having a major impact in causing the massive rate of deforestation there; the children have been looking at the major causes of deforestation and its potential consequences. They have also been examining the things we can do in the UK to help reduce the rate at which rainforests are being destroyed.

In History, the children have been looking at the conditions that soldiers faced in the trenches of World War 1. They have also been studying the day of the Christmas Truce. With this research, the children will be attempting to empathise with a soldier of World War 1, as they will be asked to write 2 contrasting diary entries over the next couple of weeks - a typical hellish day in the trenches and the euphoria felt on the day of the Christmas Truce.

In Maths, the children have been increasing and decreasing by percentages and have begun to study angles, looking for missing angles in triangles, quadrilaterals and polygons. **Mr Gould**

PE

All of our KS2 activities have been based around creating strategies to be successful within a problem solving activity, these have used collaboration and cooperation between groups of children.

In KS1 we have been working on finding space whilst dribbling or carrying a ball, this is used as an initial link to different sports that the children will experience over the course of the year. **Mr Cooney**

What Schools Need to Know about

The Online Safety Act was passed into UK law in October 2023, with the aim of establishing major new layers of protection for children when they're online. The government has pledged "a zero-tolerance approach to protecting children from online harm" – and the act certainly includes more powerful legislation which should help to safeguard young people in the digital world. Our guide summarises the key points for schools …

HARMFUL CONTENT

WHAT THE ACT WILL DO

Social media sites must rapidly remove illegal and/or harmful content such as bullying or harassing comments; pornography; and content that supports extremist activity or encourages or depicts violence, suicide, self harm or eating disorders. If they fail to do so, they can be fined up to 10% of their global revenue while their executives may even

ANIMAL CRUELTY

Content featuring cruelty to animals is now prohibited, even if it originates from abroad (where the law may be different) Again, it is the platform's responsibility to remove this,

MORE TRANSPARENCY

Sites must be transparent about the hazards that any children using them could encounter – by publishing risk assessments for their plotforms,

HOSTING MISLEADING ADVERTS

Sites should have easy reporting mechanisms for children (or their parents and carers) to flag up problems

What this means for you

The act has some specific implications for schools: it's essential that leaders understand the new legislation's scope and limitations. The act is certainly a positive step, but as artificial intelligence and other advances in tech continue to produce new challenges, schools will still need to remain extremely vigilant

KNOW WHERE TO GET HELP

Look out for the Code of Conduct that Ofcom is creating in response to the Online Safety Act. Note that the new legislation doesn't mean an instant change: many of its elements will only come into force at the end of 2023. An Ofcom consultation on 'protecting people from illegal harms online' will be running until February 2024.

UNDERSTAND AND EXPLAIN

Stalf should learn how to raise concerns with tech companies whose platforms contain anything upsetting or unpleasant. Students also need to be made aware of the newly strengthened laws relating to cyber-bullying, sexting or posting inappropriate content. Young people do make mistakes online – so the clearer their understanding of the possible consequences, the better.

REMEMBER THE ESSENTIALS

Remain mindful of your organisation's own online activities: the legal duty for schools to maintain appropriate software monitoring and filtering, for example, will not change.

There are some issues on which the legislation remains less clear for now: whether it's possible for Ofcom to scan encrypted private messages (such as on WhatsApp) has yet to be resolved, for instance – making this an area where, for the moment, young peo have less legal protection.

ENGAGE WITH PARENTS

Schools should also explain to parents and carers the new possibilities that the Online Safety Act affords them in terms of protecting their children. Many parents may have previously felt that there was little they could do about changing online platforms' content; they now have a far greater level of support when complaining about a company or the behaviour of an individual.
