### **Key Stage 1 News**

#### Year 1

In Literacy this week we were surprised to find two notes in our classroom saying 'eat me' and 'drink me'. We discussed where we think they had come from and who had left them! We decided we wanted to interview staff and children around school to try and find out some information and clues. The children asked learning questions using key words such as who, what, where, why, when and how.

In Science this week we have continued with our topic 'animals including humans'. We have looked at animal bodies and discussed the names of a range of body parts. The children could identify so many and I was amazed. We looked at paws, tusks, scales, horns, feathers, whiskers and lots more!

We have continued with multiplication this week and labelled lots of groups to revisit our learning from last week. We have then progressed onto recognising groups of 2, 5 and 10. The children used their knowledge of rules to count confidently and discover missing numbers in a range of sequences. We are excited to look at repeated addition next week!

As part of our 'Happy Mind' lessons this week we looked at one important thing to us that we feel our brain has helped us to learn. We enjoyed discussing our talents and how different parts of our brain help us with different things.

In Geography this week we have continued observing a map of the United Kingdom and we can know label all 4 countries and also capital cities! Test our knowledge you will be amazed!

## Year 2

In Writing, we began to collect our evidence for our newspaper report. We came up with several different interview questions and were able to ask different members of staff if they had seen anything mysterious going on. We learnt how to distinguish between a fact and an opinion and wrote a plan for our newspaper. Next week we plan to write this newspaper and share this with you all.

In Maths we started our new Fractions topic. We learnt how to identify half, quarter and thirds and know how to shade these fractions. We found out that three thirds is the same as one whole and a half is the same as two quarters.

In Science this week we brought in our homework projects and discussed with our friends which animal we decided to investigate. We talked about our habitats and plan to evaluate these next week.

In Computing we used the J2data app to create a pictogram and represent data. We have enjoyed creating our own tally charts this week and are looking forward to using the J2data app again.

In DT, we decided which meal we wanted to make from scratch. We wrote down what ingredients and equipment we need to make a pizza and drew what our design will look like. Next week we will be making our pizzas and will bring these home for us to eat.

In RE, we learnt all about the five pillars of Islam and how important they are. We learnt that there are five key practises that all Muslims are obliged to fulfil in their lifetime. These are referred to as pillars because they form the foundation of Muslim life, we were able to match the correct pictures to the pillars. The five pillars are called Shahada, Salam, Zakat, Sawmill and Hajj.

## Miss Kerrigan

### **Key Stage 2 News**

#### Year 3

In English this week we have continued to explore our class text, Journey. We have now gotten to the end of our book, and we are now preparing different sections of the story, to help us rewrite the story, as it is a wordless book. The children focused on writing the final scene where the girl meets a boy with a magical pencil too and they quickly become friends. They focused heavily on practicing their speech to coincide with this scene, and they have progressed well in understanding when to use inverted commas.

In maths we have been looking at plotting fractions onto a number line, both blank number lines and number lines with intervals. We have been looking at how some fractions have equivalents and we've been identifying these on our number lines.

In Science we have looked again at the three different kinds of skeleton, and have identified which living things fall under each category of skeleton. We also completed a shared reading activity on all the muscles in the body, in preparation for next week's lesson on muscles.

To prepare for our museum trip next week, we have started looking at the Ancient Egyptians. The class created a mind-map of all the things we already knew about the Ancient Egyptians and after watching some educational clips in class, we added more to it based on what we had then learned from the videos.

In geography we continued looking at renewable and non-renewable resources and completed the map of England from last week.

In R.E. the children looked closer at the 10 Gurus of Sikhism and learned about what each one brought to the religion.

## Year 4

This week in Year 4, in Maths we have started to explore fractions. We have thought about what a fraction is and recapped all our previous knowledge such as the vocabulary needed and what we mean when we talk about fractions. We then looked at putting fractions on a number line by splitting it into equal parts using fractions strips. We then got even more advanced and put fractions

with different denominations on the same number line and thought about what we noticed such as the smaller the part the larger the denominator. We then thought about fractions greater than one and how we can look at these as improper fractions, where the numerator is larger than the denominator, and as mixed numbers, where each time the numerator and denominator as equal we know they make one whole with fractions left over.

In English, we have been thinking about describing Tranio's day. We have written and performed role plays in role as a modern-day child and Tranio discussing what he does and where he goes. We then used these role-plays to help us write a diary entry as Tranio about a normal day in his life.

In PHSE, we have been looking at Teamwork and what does it mean to be part of a team What happens if we don't work together? The children discussed what happens if not everyone plays their role in a team. They then had to solve a mystery using the clues given as a team to work out who did it.

In Geography, we have been looking at volcanoes. We looked at where the tectonic plates are located around the world and then looked at where most volcanoes are located and we could see the same pattern. We looked at how different forms of volcanoes are formed and then used VRS to go and visit a volcano and to look at their structure. We then drew and labelled our own composite volcanoes before starting our research to make a non-chronological report about volcanoes later this item.

#### Homework

As you know the Multiplication Check is in just 4 short weeks. The children have brought home any times tables they are still working on and I have sent a recent heat map. Can you please encourage them to use Hit the Button, Maths shed and TT Rockstars as well as good old just pencil and paper to practice those tables they still are not sure of.

## Reading Plus x 2

### **Mrs Shone**

### Year 5

This week in Year 5, we looked at percentages and converted them into fractions and decimals. We learned that 0.25 is 1/4, 0.5 is 1/2 and 0.75 is 3/4; we will continue to practice so that we can recall this easily.

In our writing, we completed our biography about Chris Hadfield (the famous Canadian astronaut). We included key areas of his life including: family, education, career and what he is up to now. Also, we used relative clauses, quotes and brackets for parenthesis.

In geography, we created charts on Microsoft Word to show food miles and the amount of CO2 that is produced. Using our data from our last lesson, we were able to create the charts and edit the designs.

For our computing topic, we looked at vectors (online pictures created using shapes and lines). We had a go at using Google drawings to create buildings using shapes and lines. We looked at examples of other vectors including logos such as Pokémon, Batman and the like button on Facebook.
