Have a great weekend everyone and enjoy the weather while it lasts!

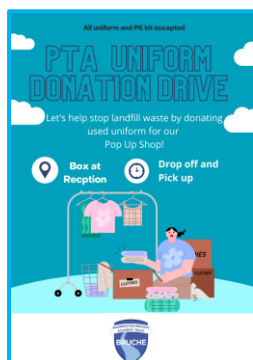

Key Stage 1 News

Year 1

In Literacy this week the excitement has continued!!! We received a suspicious golden envelope with a letter inside addressed to Year 1. Mr Dixon informed us it had arrived at school the night before and he was so excited to deliver it to us! There were several clues in the letter including a picture of a pocket watch and a black hat. The letter was sent from 'Alice' and we are starting to wonder if it is Alice from Alice in Wonderland! We asked key questions to her and we are so excited to search for more clues. We have also looked at compound words this week and can now confidently identify these in a range of texts.

In Math's this week we have continued with our exciting topic on multiplication. We have spent lots of time looking at repeated addition and how this helps us with multiplication. We have labelled a range of groups and worked hard to find the total. On Friday we completed a mini assessment and we are ready to start division next week!

In Computing this week we have explored digital painting on the laptops. We have discussed how we can paint using computers and worked hard on our mouse skills to draw shapes and lines.

As part of our 'Happy Mind' lessons this week have revisited the 3 parts of our brain and explained the function of each one!

We have revisited seasonal changes in science this week and looked at the life cycle of a chick. We reflected on our visit from the living eggs in our classroom and watched a wonderful video watching them hatch! We completed a detailed piece of writing and now know some new vocabulary such as incubation.

Year 2

Year 2 have had another very busy and creative week.

In Writing, we investigated words that were written in the past and the present. We changed the verbs into past tense verbs, wrote the correct verbs in a sentence and corrected verbs to ensure it was written in the present tense. We also looked at different compound words and used these in sentences.

In Maths, we have continued our learning of Fractions and did lots of investigating. We folded different shapes to find out what a half looked like, quarters and thirds. We consolidated our learning of fractions by joining in with a fractions quiz and started to compare different fractions using a fractions wall.

In DT, we were all so excited to look at our animal habitats. We discussed our animals and the facts that we had found out for homework. We evaluated our finished product and discussed improvements that we could make if we were to make it again. Later on in the week we collected all of the ingredients we needed to make a cheese and ham tomato pizza. We used a knife to spread the tomato puree, pitta breads as our base and sprinkled cheese and ham on top. It looked delicious!

In PSHE, we completed another 'My Happy Mind' session and focused on how amazing our Neuroplasticity is in our brains. We discussed what we find most challenging in life currently and how our brains can help us.

In Science, we learnt all animals. We identified different animal groups and classified animals according to their characteristics.

Another great week Year 2! Well done!

Key Stage 2 News

Year 3

In English we have been working so hard on rewriting our storybook, Journey this week! In total we've spent 4 whole days carefully planning and writing our story. The children worked well at making sure they included similes, prepositions, expanded noun phrases and even some metaphors!

In maths we have started to investigate how to find fractions of an amount. Everyone worked well at following the rules in order to find unit fractions, and non-unit fractions.

In History, we started looking at what achievements Ancient Sumer had experienced. We learned that they were the first civilisation to begin writing on clay tablets, using cuneiform (symbols) rather than letters to record their lives.

We also had an amazing time at Liverpool World Museum on Wednesday. All the children enjoyed the mummification workshop and asked some really fantastic questions. I think everyone's favourite part of the day was going into the Mummy Room where we got to see real ancient mummies.

In Science we explored the muscles of the human body. All the children named all the important muscle groups in the human body. We even went into the hall to explore the interactive human body on the interactive board.

Year 4

This week in Year 4 in Maths, we have been learning about fractions that are more than 1. We have thought about crossing one and how we can record this. We have been looking at changing mixed number fractions to improper fractions and improper fractions to mixed numbers before we move on to equivalent fractions next week.

In English, we have been hearing more from our book *Escape to Pompeii*. We have been thinking about language, and have been looking at zones of relevance for vocabulary. We thought about how much a character might be experiencing different feelings at different parts of the story. We have then been looking at the present perfect and how we can show things started in the past but can still be taking place.

In Geography, we have finished looking at mountains, volcanoes and earthquakes by learning about how earthquakes take place and there has been some excellent use of geographical language. We found out that earthquakes usually happen along transformational tectonic plates and are caused by plates rubbing together and getting stuck, the friction and the movement of pulling apart causes earthquakes. It is safe to say the children were really interested and asked so many questions. We then looked into the Japanese earthquake of 2011 and have written information boards about the what, where why and when.

Out of class, the children have discovered a real love of scientific investigation and curiosity about nature and many have become Bruche's Bug Hunters. They have been taking handheld magnifying pots out onto the field and seeing what they can discover. It has been really lovely to see their enthusiasm and how they have been thinking of their own investigations to carry out.

Year 5

This week in Year 5 we have been learning about angles. We recapped our knowledge from previous years about the classifications of angles: acute, obtuse, right. We then moved onto how these fit into degree classifications e.g. an acute angle is less than 90 degrees, a right angle is 90 degrees etc. Finally, we worked out angles on a straight line (they must add up to 180 degrees).

In writing, we began our new writing topic! We will be writing a set of instructions based on the book *Holes*. Our set of instructions will be about 'How to stay safe in Camp Green Lake'. We first looked at an example of a set of instructions and then some ambitious vocabulary we could include.

For our science topic, we looked at the history of space exploration. We saw how rocket technology has improved and how the war was a key part in starting the creation of rockets. We then ordered these key events into a timeline.

Last week, we had our art day! We looked at images of faces and drawings. Then, we had a go at sketching different faces, before modelling one with clay. This week, now that they have set, we painted them!

Finally, in computing, we continued looking at vector drawings. We were tasked with duplicating a set of images using just copy and paste of a circle and a square. We had to make: a bus, a pig, a castle and a robot.

Year 6

Year 6 have continued to revise hard for their SATS exams this week.

In Maths, the children have been covering probability; revising rounding; converting between miles and kilometres; translating shapes and coordinates and general mental arithmetic practice.

In English, the children have been looking at a variety of grammar concepts with a focus on learning the variety of tenses, including: the past and present perfect tenses and the past and present progressive tenses, along with a variety of other areas.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about HELLDIVERS 2



WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

Within weeks of release, Helldivers 2 had become one of 2024's biggest gaming success stories. The sequel to a top-down shooter from 2015 has smashed sales expectations, owing to its frantic gameplay and tongue-in-cheek humour. However, the game comes with several risks to younger players, as indicated by its 18+ rating.

PEGI 18 RATING



Due to its intense violence and the presence of in-game purchases, Helldivers 2 carries a PEGI 18 rating. While players are generally fighting fantastical enemies like giant bugs and robots, their characters can be killed in various gruesome ways, up to and including dismemberment. It's certainly worth considering whether such a game is appropriate for younger players.

IN-GAME PURCHASES

In Helldivers 2, players can use real money to buy in-game currency, with which they can unlock cosmetics and new weapons. At the time of writing, all the in-game items can be acquired without spending so much as a penny – but excited young players wanting to keep up with their friends may still feel the temptation to purchase new weapons more quickly, rather than laboriously earning the in-game currency through play.

VOICE CHAT AND MESSAGING

Helldivers 2 is always played online with others, who often use voice chat or in-game texts to coordinate, strategise or just joke around. This does mean that children who play without their friends will be put in contact with strangers. Unfortunately, this represents a roll of the dice, as the game can't control how people treat each other online. However, you can easily report other players for abusive behaviour via the game's 'Social' tab.

FRUSTRATION TRIGGER

The thrill of barely scraping through a dangerous mission in one piece is integral to Helldivers 2's appeal. To accentuate this feeling of achievement, the game includes some very difficult levels that could prove to be too hard for some players – even those who are legitimately old enough to play. Losing streaks can be incredibly annoying, so repeatedly failing in missions could easily provoke frustration or anger in younger players.

LACK OF ACCESS



The game is available on PC and PS5, but not (as yet) on other consoles. Some people will naturally be disappointed they can't get involved and might look for similar alternatives to play on their own console – alternatives which may contain similar levels of violence and gore but lack the same balanced approach to user misconduct and in-game purchases as Helldivers 2.

Advice for Parents & Educators

GIVE IT A GO FIRST



Helldivers 2 is a third-person shooter with intentionally humorous elements, but much of its comedy is rooted in satire which may go over the heads of some players. Consider playing the game first yourself – while shooting bugs and robots feels too unrealistic to be upsetting, seeing your character get torn to pieces may be too much for young players.

SET EXPECTATIONS



At the time of writing, Helldivers 2 costs £34.99. It could turn out to be an expensive and wasteful purchase if a player gets irritated and gives up shortly after receiving the game. If a young person tends to become frustrated easily, it's worth considering whether Helldivers 2 is really the game for them.

CONSIDER ALTERNATIVES



If playing on Xbox – where Helldivers 2 isn't available – consider something like Halo: The Master Chief Collection as an alternative. One of its game modes – Firefight – replicates Helldivers' mechanics to some degree. Alternatively, younger players may be better suited to the more light-hearted Deep Rock Galactic, which sees them play as fantasy dwarves in space, involving far less gruesome violence.

KEEP AN EYE ON PAYMENTS

Many titles offer in-game purchases, but Helldivers 2's are comparatively cheap. You'll still need to monitor your payment information (or use a prepaid card on the account), in case your child buys the in-game currency in bulk; on the whole, however, the game's selling methods are far less egregious than most similar titles on the market.

MONITOR COMMUNICATION & ADJUST SETTINGS

Thanks to an in-game "Ping" system (allowing players to highlight important details without speaking), communication isn't as integral to Helldivers 2 as it is in other games. You can turn off the chat options in-game on PC, or on the PS5's own settings, and feel more secure in the knowledge that your child won't be speaking to people they don't know.
