Key Stage 1 News

Year 1

Year 1 have had a great week this week and worked very hard. They have all come back with a lovely attitude to learning and participated well in lessons. In Literacy this week we have started a new text 'Lost in the Toy Museum' and discussed what we think the book will be about. The children wrote their own predictions and asked key questions about the story. We discussed what toys may be lost and we are excited to discover if the toys come to life at night in the museum!

In Math's this week we have continued with place value. We have revisited greater than, less than and equals symbols comparing groups of objects and numbers. The children have impressed me with their use of mathematical vocabulary and completed their challenges with confidence. We have also ordered numbers independently and discussed how the value of digits in 2 digit numbers helps us

determine whether they are greater or smaller. On Friday we looked at reading and writing numbers to 20 in words.

In Geography this week we have discussed how weather can affect us across all 4 seasons. We looked at appropriate clothing for different weather conditions and talked about how weather is something we cannot control. We have also learnt about human and physical features and listed a range of features we can see on a satellite map of our local area.

We started a new topic in RE this week; Islam. We now know that Muslims believe in one God called Allah.

Well done Year 1 keep up the great work!

Year 2

Welcome back everyone! Year Two have had an excellent week. All children have really impressed me with their behaviour and attitudes towards learning!

In Maths this week we have learnt how to use different methods to solve different number problems. We have used diene's, numberlines and even the column method! We have all shown great understanding of the value of the numbers and are growing in so much confidence explaining our reasoning.

Key Stage 2 News

Year 3

This week in maths we have been working on challenging 2-step word questions where the children had to make decisions themselves about which they needed to work out first in order to help them get the right answer.

In English we have planned a letter that we are writing to our main characters dad, telling him all the fun things we've been up to with the characters new friend. Then, they wrote it out neatly, making sure they used all their adverbs of time and conjunctions correctly.

In science, we started our new topic on 'light'. We investigated different translucent, transparent, and opaque materials and found the correct definition for each of them.

In history, we used the iPads to research the Stone Age settlement, Skara Brae which was founded in Orkney, Scotland in 1850 after a huge storm uncovered it!

We've been investigating homophones again in our spelling lessons and have been generating a large list of the ones we know. We then took what we had learnt and put the homophones into sentences.

We of course had our pantomime trip on Thursday! All children were so well behaved and thoroughly enjoyed themselves!

The children began their new R.E topic learning about Islam.

Year 4

We have had a busy week in our first week back in Year 4.

In English, we have started our new novel 'The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane' which is a beautiful book and one I know the children will love. We have made predictions about what we think the book is about based on what we can see on the front and back cover. We have then thought about what Edward looked like and what his personality is like.

In Maths, we have been looking at a variety of different of strategies for solving addition and subtraction calculations mentally. We have looked at ways such as using the inverse, partitioning, reordering, compensating and estimating to work out and check our answers.

In History, we have been looking at why the Greeks are still important and have looked at the different forms of government that existed in Ancient Greek times such as monarchy, oligarchy and tyranny before looking at the Athenians introducing democracy which is one of our British Values.

On Thursday we of course had a fabulous time at the Jack and the Beanstalk pantomime (oh no we didn't oh yes we did). The children had a fabulous time and thoroughly enjoyed it.

Year 6

Year 6 have been investigating the wars England and Britain have been involved in since 1066. They have looked at specific dates of when Britain and the UK has been formed. They have also looked at the causes and consequences of World War 1, building up to writing a newspaper article, where they will announce the end of World War 1 with a particular focus on the reasons that led to the end of the war.

In PSHE, the children have been examining diversity within the UK, looking at ethnic group and religious diversity. They then looked at what made themselves unique and created identity wheels which highlighted things that they thought were most important in making them unique.

In Science, the children researched balanced diets and how having a balanced diet was essential for future health.

In Computing, the children learnt about how websites are made.

In Maths, Y6 have been linking together algebra with coordinates, creating coordinates from equations. They have been plotting coordinates and translating them in four quadrants.

They have also been reasoning and solving problems involving algebra.

What Children & Young People Need to Know about

SPEECH SPEECH

Everyone in the UK has the right of "freedom of expression". That's the right to voice your opinions and share information and ideas with others. It's not the right to say whatever you want without regard for others' feelings and values. We all have a responsibility to use this right properly: being respectful and inclusive to those around us, rather than making offensive and threatening remarks. That's called 'hate speech' and knowing the difference is incredibly important.

Free speech is a person's legal right to share information, opinions and ideas without fear of retaliation, censorship or legal consequences. This freedom of expression is recognised in international human rights legislation, and here's what it does for us in our day-to-day lives ...

The Human Rights Act 1988 states that everyone has the right to express themselves freely – even if their views are unpopular and might offend others.

Freedom of expression encourages listening to others and allowing opposing views to be heard. It's important to respect someone's opinion, even if we disagree with it. Free speech lets us engage in

meaningful discussions with people who

Any concept could potentially offend someone. Galileo's theories were incredibly offensive to many at the time, while not everyone agrees with Darwin, even today. A frequent exchange of ideas is vitally important for a healthy society.

FKEEDUM

Free speech allows us to engage people we disagree with in a debate. The ability to challenge others' views is healthy – while having ours challenged helps us learn how to deal with criticism and think deeply about what we say and believe.

Freedom of expression includes the right not to do something, like not standing up for — or singing — the national anthem.
Even though some people would find that offensive, it isn't illegal. By law, nobody can force you to say anything you don't want to.

Free speech is a powerful tool for change, justice and reform. Many modern UK rights – such as women being allowed to vote, decent working conditions or same-sex marriage – couldn't have been achieved without it.

GLOBAL EQUALITY COLLECTIVE Hate speech refers to any communication – like talking, texting or posting online – that negatively targets a group or an individual because they are perceived to be different in some way. Demonising and dehumanising statements, threats, identity-based insults, offensive name-calling and slurs would all count as hate speech. Here are some common forms it takes...

Targeting people or groups because of a protected characteristic – like race, gender identity, sexuality, nationality, religion or a disability – and verbally abusing them with slurs and name-calling. The Equality Act 2010 has more information on this.

Content that dehumanises people based on the same characteristics: referring to them as if they were animals, objects or other non-human entities, for example. Separating the target from other human beings is usually an attempt to justify the speaker's bigotry.

Calling for violence or hatred against certain people or groups and justifying and glorifying those actions. Suggesting that a certain group should be removed from society could be seen as a call to arms, for example – potentially putting people from that group in danger.

Claiming that specific types of people are physically, mentally or morally inferior (or even that they are criminals) to encourage others to view them in the same way. This kind of thinking is always incorrect – but can be incredibly harmful to the group in question.

Spreading damaging misinformation about a person or group that the speaker views as "different" – essentially, trying to turn others against them by lying. Someone might claim that a recent tragedy is the fault of this entire group, when this is simply not possible.

Promoting the segregation of certain groups, or discrimination against them, because of who they are. This has been illegal in the UK for a long time – but some people still try to promote the exclusion of others, which can cause a huge amount of distress.
