Reception

The reception children have had a fantastic start to the new year and new term and what a great way to start our new story '*The Storm Whale in Winter*' with a little bit of snow and ice.

We have been introducing ourselves to our new character – a little boy called Noi by writing a speech bubble for our mini me. He was so happy with our writing that he sent us a parcel with our story book delivery. The children have loved learning all our new vocabulary for the story such as 'glimpse' and 'distance' and we made sure we remembered them by putting actions to them.

After reading the story we received another speech bubble to read and we had to work out who had sent it. It said 'I am big. I can tip my fin.' We decided it was from the Storm Whale and so the children then created their own representations of whales in the playdough and creative area and wrote a speech bubble to match. The children blew me away with their knowledge of whales and the different types after looking at real life photographs.

The children have been designing their own lighthouses and building them, making sure they use different materials for the sea and rocks. They have also been adding other sea creatures to their creations.

In Maths we have been fishing for numbers using magnets to collect the sea creature number cards and put them into the corresponding net. We have been counting backwards from 10 to 0 verbally, using number cards and finding the missing numbers on a number track.

We have had lots of outside fun, wrapping up warm and looking at ways to melt the ice, making ice drinks in the mud kitchen, painting ice and our favourite was cracking the ice to see the bubbles inside.

We have had a very busy week and I am looking forward to next week where we will be building a boat for Noi's dad.

Key Stage 1 News

Year 1

This week in Maths, we have been learning about the inverse of different calculations using part–part–whole models and tens frames. We also focused on finding the difference, using our subtraction knowledge to help us work out the answers.

In Writing, we started our new writing scheme. We discovered some unusual objects in our classroom and discussed and debated where we thought they came from. We then wrote predictions, explaining where we thought the toys had come from and why they were here. We used our grammar and punctuation knowledge to support our writing. We also moved on to naming different toys and learning what the word plural means. We added suffixes to root words to make them plural, using 's' and 'es'.

In Computing, we used the laptops to create digital art. We logged into the Paint app and explored the different tools to create some beautiful digital pictures. We really loved this lesson and enjoyed being creative.

In PSHE, we explored what our brain does on a daily basis and discussed the technical terms used to describe the different parts of the brain. Ask us what they are and see if we can remember! In Spanish, we learned how to identify different colours and say them in Spanish.

Year 2

In English this week we have started our new book, The Night Gardener. The children worked so hard at identifying different adjectives they could use to describe the images in the story. We then created our own simile poem based on things from the front cover.

In maths we have used our number bond knowledge to help us with adding and subtracting up to 100.

In History, we completed an end of topic quiz all on our significant people. The children remembered so much about them!

In Geography, we compared Thembisa and Warrington. We looked at each location on Google Maps to really get a good idea of what it is like in Thembisa. We found it was extremely different as they have sandy roads, live closely with one another and don't have many skyscrapers/tall buildings.

In Science, we did a little experiment to see how materials can change with force. The children were given different objects to play with and to see if they would change. We had a fabulous time at the pantomime on Friday also!

Key Stage 2 News

Year 3

Year 3 have had a very busy first week back!

In English we wrote predictions based on our new book. We looked at some clues such as water, flowers and branches and tried to figure out what the plot may be. We discovered that the story is called 'Rhythm of the Rain' and wrote a kennings poem based on a river, listing all the different characteristics and describing it without using the word 'river'.

In Maths we have continued building up our understanding of column addition. We recapped adding two digit numbers together with one exchange before moving on to practising adding two numbers together with more than one exchange. We all worked very hard when making sure to lay our sums out correctly, and not to forget to add our exchange!

In RE we finished our topic on Islam by thinking about guidance Muslims might follow. We wrote down good advice and bad advice we would give someone who is Muslim, and compared it to advice we would follow, discovering that our moral beliefs and behaviour are very similar.

We finished our rock and soils topic in Science by exploring the different types of soil. We learnt that different types of soil have different components and uses, and carried out an investigation where we classified soils by looking at how they reacted to water.

Year 4

This week in Year 4, we have been writing outsider narratives. We have been considering our use of language and vocabulary to show Leaf's feelings of being alone and afraid without anyone showing him any kindness. We have been considering how to move paragraphs on using fronted adverbials of time and manner to show changes.

In maths, we have been recapping our knowledge of addition with multiple exchanges before moving on to formal methods of subtraction. We began by thinking of the rules of subtraction such as largest number first and that we always take the bottom number away from the top number even if it can be a bit more tricky at times. We then started to look at how to make exchanges if we did not have enough in a column.

We have had a very Scientific week in year 4, we began by looking at what food chains are and the different scientific vocabulary needed to be able to construct and label one correctly. We learnt that food chains begin with producers and then animals that are prey and predators. We spoke how the energy flows along the chain. We then had a go and ordering and labelling our first chains. We then looked at how animals diets can be seen in the teeth of animals. We thought about herbivores, carnivores and omnivores and how we can tell what they are just by looking at their teeth. We looked at lots of pictures of animals skulls and determined what their diet was and then had a go at guessing the animals name just from their skull. We then had a go at creating our own food chains for a variety of different habitats

Year 5

Welcome back! I hope you all had a lovely break over the holidays!

This week we have started our multiplication and division topic in maths. We began we recapping some of our times table facts - we will continue to practise these facts so that we are super confident in recalling them. We also multiplied numbers by 10, 100 and 1000, remembering to jump the number up the correct number of place value columns.

In writing, we had to make predictions about our new text. We were given clues to help us, including: a muddy, ripped shirt, some candles, some mysterious music, a piece of wood with some claw marks in and an old tobacco pipe. The book was then revealed to us: The Hound of the Baskervilles (a Sherlock Holmes mystery). We began reading sections of the book investigated the vocabulary used.

For our history topic, we looked at the settlement locations of the Vikings and Anglo Saxons. We noticed that the Vikings lived close to the coast and many lived in the North East.

In RE we learnt the story of Pandora's box. We learnt that sometimes stories that we hear are not true but that the moral and meaning hidden in the story can be true e.g. Pandora did not actually open a box and release evil on the world, but the lesson - that actions can have consequences - is true.

On Friday, we were incredibly lucky to watch Beauty and the Beast! We were extremely excited for this school trip and loved the show!

Year 6

In RE, the children continued to explore key life milestones by creating personal life timelines, helping them to understand that life is a journey. They learned more about important Hindu milestones and thoughtfully compared and contrasted these with their own life experiences, developing their understanding of different beliefs and cultures.

In Maths, the children focused on adding and subtracting negative numbers, using number lines to support their reasoning and deepen their understanding of how negative numbers work.

They also completed revision of important mental arithmetic concepts and carried out some assessment.

In English and History, the children began preparing to write newspaper articles, exploring key features of the genre while developing their understanding of historical events.

They also completed revision of important grammar concepts and carried out some assessment.

In History, the children explored conflicts throughout time, starting with the year 1066. They learned that Britain has not been successfully conquered since then and discussed how being an island has helped to protect the country from invasion.

The children also studied a fictitious historical source called Archie's Scrapbook. Using this scrapbook, they explored what life may have been like for a child during World War I. They began to understand why the war started and learned about how it affected children and families back at home.

The children also learned about the countries involved in the war and how it impacted societies and people around the world. They explored historical sources, including books that were given to children during World War I, to help them understand events happening at the time.

In Science, the children continued learning about classification, exploring the important work of Carl Linnaeus. They studied real classification systems used to group living things and applied this knowledge to real-life examples.

The children researched a wide range of living organisms in a chosen habitat - many of the children chose to focus on the Amazon rainforest as part of their learning.

In Geography, the children learned about the importance of the Amazon rainforest and explored the differences between temperate and tropical environments. They created mean temperature data from rainforests around the world and compared levels of rainfall. The children also investigated where most of the world's tropical and temperate rainforests are located. In addition, they learned about the vital role rainforests play in helping to reduce climate change by absorbing greenhouse gases such as carbon dioxide.
